#### **Appendix 2 - Covid-19 Risk Assessment**

RCCG (KKT) Church Building COVID-19 Risk Assessment (V1.10)

This risk assessment must be completed for church building reopen / to remains open within the Government guidelines. This risk assessment will help congregations identify appropriate control measures that must be in place to protect members of the congregation, volunteers and visitors from the risk of Covid-19 infection. The control measures in this risk assessment reflect current best practice and should be regarded as the minimum standard for the church buildings and congregation within the relevant government tier for local restrictions.

The current Government guidance states a move to Plan B in response to the risk of Omicron variant. Face coverings are required by law in places of worship. Information in appendix 2.1 summarises how National regulations impact activities in the place of worship. APPENDIX 2.2 is culled from the government COVID 19 guidance to places of worship titled GUIDANCE COVID 19 RESPONSE: AUTUMN AND WINTER PLAN 2021 (Updated 9 November 2021).

# Hazards Associated with The Coronavirus Pandemic

# 1. Infection: Aerosol or droplet transmission of COVID 19

Potential risks to members of the congregation, volunteers & visitors caused by the hazards.

Threat of person who enters the church building due to its public nature that they may be exposed to Covid-19.

People can catch the virus from others who are infected in the following ways:

- Virus moves from person-toperson in droplets from the nose or mouth spread when a person with the virus coughs or exhales
- The virus can survive for 72 hours or longer on surfaces which people have touched or coughed on, etc.
- People can pick up the virus by breathing in the droplets or by touching contaminated surfaces and then touching their eyes or mouth

Some people are asymptomatic (They do not show symptoms of Covid-19). Therefore, it is vitally important that reasonable precautions are in place and followed at all times.

#### **Control Measures**

The church will provide training on COVID19 infection, prevention and control for all workers and volunteers. In addition, it will comply with its statutory duty to provide a safe environment, with reference to the Covid-19 pandemic by:

- Ensuring that all members, volunteers and visitors are aware of the infection prevention and control precautions that are in place within your buildings and the behaviour expected of them during the pandemic to keep themselves and others safe.
- Require all members, volunteers and visitors to practice physical distancing when within the building and surrounding areas.

The Church will communicate and reinforce key Government public health messages and those from the RCCG Central Office to all members, volunteers and visitors who visit our buildings:

- Reinforcing that anyone who is unwell or who shows symptoms of Covid-19 (High temperature / fever, cough or loss of smell), who is in the extremely vulnerable group, who is shielding, who is isolating, or who is living with someone who is isolating or is unwell must not attend church.
- An appropriate use of face covering required when inside the building (covering the nose and mouth). Signage to this effect on display. Face masks must be used in addition to face shields / visors. Any adult who cannot cope with wearing a facemask throughout the period of service will need to join the services online. Those who cannot adhere to wearing of face masks for

## APPENDIX 2.1 Summary of how current National regulations impact activities in the place of worship

Activity	Places of worship remain open for communal worship. This is now one of the very few legal exemptions that allow larger numbers of people to gather. It is therefore crucial that places of worship and those attending comply with both law and the COVID-19 Secure guidance.
Individual Prayer	A single person or individual household may enter the venue to pray on their own. No specific restrictions.
Communal Prayer / Devotions and Meditation	Open for as many people as can be safely accommodated with social distancing measures
Communal Worship	Open for as many people as can be safely accommodated with social distancing measures
Wedding Ceremonies	Open for as many people as can be safely accommodated with social distancing measures
Wedding Receptions	Wedding receptions will have to comply with the new requirements where they meet the attendee threshold set out in the guidance.
Funerals	Permitted without any specific cap on numbers attending. A statutory risk assessment must be carried out and all reasonable measures taken to limit risk of transmission of coronavirus.

#### **APPENDIX 2.2 GUIDANCE COVID 19 RESPONSE: AUTUMN AND WINTER PLAN 2021 (Updated 9 November 2021)**

### Plan B

If the data suggests the NHS is likely to come under unsustainable pressure, the Government has prepared a Plan B for England. The Government hopes not to have to implement Plan B, but given the uncertainty, it is setting out details now so that the public and businesses know what to expect if further measures become necessary.

Given the high levels of protection in the adult population against COVID-19 by vaccination, relatively small changes in policy and behaviour could have a big impact on reducing (or increasing) transmission, bending the epidemic curve and relieving pressure on the NHS. Thanks to the success of the vaccination programme, it should be possible to handle a further resurgence with less damaging measures than the lockdowns and economic and social restrictions deployed in the past. The Government would provide prior notice as far as possible to the public and Parliament ahead of implementing any necessary changes in a Plan B scenario.

The Government's Plan B prioritises measures which can help control transmission of the virus while seeking to minimise economic and social impacts. This includes:

- a. Communicating clearly and urgently to the public that the level of risk has increased, and with it the need to behave more cautiously.
- b. Introducing mandatory vaccine-only COVID-status certification in certain settings.
- c. Legally mandating face coverings in certain settings.

The Government would also consider asking people once again to work from home if they can, for a limited period. The Government recognises this causes more disruption and has greater immediate costs to the economy and some businesses than the other Plan B interventions, so a final decision would be made based on the data at the time.
